

Liquids 3-1-1 Rule

You are allowed up to 3.4 oz liquid containers.
They must all fit comfortably in a quart size clear plastic bag.

TSA Liquids Rule Guide

3-1-1 Rule

- 3** Liquids must be in 3.4 oz containers or smaller
Size of container matters; not amount of liquid inside
- 1** Quart-sized, resealable bag
Containers must fit "comfortably" inside one bag
- 1** One bag per person
Separate bag from your carry-on

Hand sanitizer
One container can be up to 12 ounces

TSA Pre-Check?
Liquid bag can stay in carry-on

What Is A "Liquid?"

What counts: "liquids, aerosols, gels, creams and pastes"

- Toothpaste
- Shampoo
- Lotion, etc.
- Hairspray
- Shaving cream

Foods Can Also Count...

- Any other foods you can scoop, slurp, mash or squeeze may be considered liquids
- Honey, gravy and jam, creamy dips and spreads
- Applesauce, maple syrup and oils
- Peanut butter, salad dressing and soups

Medical Exceptions

You must inform TSA officers you have medically necessary liquids and separate them

TSA allows larger amounts of medically necessary liquids, gels, and aerosols in reasonable quantities for your trip

Ice packs and gel packs are acceptable in a frozen or partially-frozen state

"Reasonable quantities" means the duration of your trip (e.g., one week) plus an extra day or two

Baby Essentials

- Formula, breast milk and juice are permitted in "reasonable quantities"
- Set of liquid-filled teethers allowed
- Canned, jarred and processed baby food allowed

Inform TSA at beginning of screening process about excess liquids and separate them

"Reasonable quantities" typically means the duration of your flight

Important Reminder

Whether or not your items are accepted comes down to the discretion of the TSA officer

X-rays

Section 6

Excess liquids are often screened by X-ray

Note: FDA states that there are no known adverse effects from eating food, drinking beverages, and using medicine screened by X-ray.

Ask about alternatives if needed

Alcohol

You may drink your own alcohol during your flight BUT...

Alcohol can be brought on-board in containers no larger than 3.4 ounces (100 ml) in a quart-sized bag BUT...

- No alcohol greater than 70% is allowed!
- If alcohol is over 24% and not greater than 70% it must be in unopened retail packaging
- Unfinished bottles may be thrown away!

Duty free

You may carry duty free liquids in secure, tamper-evident bags, larger than 3.4 oz or 100 ml in your carry-on bag if the following are true:

- The duty free liquids were purchased internationally and you are traveling to the United States with a connecting flight.
- The liquids are packed in a transparent, secure, tamper-evident bag by the retailer and do not show signs of tampering when presented to TSA for screening.
- The original receipt for the liquids is present and the purchase was made within 48 hours.
